The Last Will and Testament of James Rapplye Background and Introduction

Background

In the spring of 2021, we received a request from Ellen Dauzat, a resident of Avoyelles Parish, to translate a document written in French. Ellen and a colleague of hers were researching a certain female who lived in the 1800s named *Martiene Rappilier*. Hoping to discover the identity of *Martiene's* father, Ellen located the **Last Will and Testament of James Rapplye** among publicly available documents.

We received a copy of that document written in a very legible manuscript on two and one-half well-preserved pages. Nearly all the words and names were distinct and required very little guesswork before the context of the document made clear the intended word(s). Because it is a legal document, the Will contains most of the usual phrases one finds in similar documents, but there are some unusual and informative historical aspects, ones we wanted to share with our readers.

The document bears the heading, "State of Louisiana, West Baton Rouge Parish," and it is dated September 4, 1832. It was dictated in the presence of Louis Favrot, Judge of West Baton Rouge Parish, and three witnesses. The reason for the presence of the judge and witnesses is not made clear until page 2, lines 75 and 76 of the translation when the testator explains that he "does not know how to write" and that he will be signing the document with his mark (X).

James Rapplye declares himself to be a free man of color (FMC), and therefore not a slave. Free persons of color in places where slavery was legal at the time, as Louisiana was in 1832, are comparatively few in number. By inference, given his land and other possessions, including some slaves, James was a person of considerable wealth. In his Will, he instructs his executor to make certain dispositions of his possessions: his lands, improvements and furniture. Some of his directives specify the liberation of certain slaves, a few of which were his own relatives.

Introduction

That a free person of color would own slaves at all, or even entertain the notion of owning slaves, gives us a powerful insight into this man's thinking about slavery in general. Today, we might guess that free persons of color in those times may have abhorred the very thought of slavery. But this man's slave ownership forces us to take the much wider view that slavery during those times was a very complex and multi-faceted issue.

To assist Ellen's research and to facilitate study from our readers, we have published both the original French document and our English translation together with this background and introduction. For ease of following the French-to-English translation, we have set down the translation in the same lengths of the lines from the original. Further, in the style of a legal deposition, we have numbered the lines in the translation.

It should be noted that spellings during this time period, especially proper names, were not fixed as they are today, but instead they were often spelled phonetically.

In this manner, both *Rappilier* and *Rapplye* are pronounced very similarly in French, and Ellen wisely thought the two families might be related.

Even more to the point of Ellen's research, on page 2, line 41 of the Will it mentions a negress named *Martine*. Since her last name is not given, we can speculate that *Martine* was likely a slave, the property of the testator, James Rapplye.

A widely practiced custom in those times was to impute the same last name as the slave owner to all of their slaves. In this case, *Martine's* last name would be imputed to be *Rapplye*.

Ellen desires to know the identity of Martiene Rappilier's father.

Q: Is the *Martine* (*Rapplye*) mentioned in the Will the same person as the *Martiene Rapplier* for whom Ellen searches?

A: We simply cannot know for certain on the basis of this document alone, but we can speculate that they are possibly the very same person.

Q: Does the will mention the identity of *Martiene Rappilier's* father?

A: No, there is no mention of *Martiene's* father in the Will. If they were the very same person, it is possible that James Rapplye may be *Martiene/Martine's* father, but for now we can only speculate as to whether that is so.

Translating any document from one language to another usually involves expressions which, when translated literally, do not seem to convey what was originally intended. This Will has been translated both literally in some cases and figuratively in others; in this manner, some of the original French meaning and intention is carried into the English translation, but hopefully without leading the reader astray.

Louisiana history reminds us that our part of the world has been ruled under French, Spanish and British flags in earlier times. From its early days, the Louisiana Legislature published all its documents and laws in parallel French and English. Louisiana's first state constitution is an example of that practice. Documents from those different eras were often written in French or Spanish as well as English, and now many of those documents are now available for online viewing.

For our readers who aspire to translate from one language to another, Google has a very good and easy-to-use TRANSLATE function. It allows users to type in the word or phrase needing translation and the result is automatic. It offers translation from a wide variety of both common and not-so-common languages, so have some fun and give it a try.
